Successful Democratic Standards Committee members are supported by professional staff at the SU in the democracy team. If you're elected, these staff will ensure you are trained and have the support needed to carry out this role.

What can you expect from the role?

- To meet monthly to discuss and assign ideas proposed by students to the appropriate democratic avenue
- To meet before Student Council and Annual Members' Meeting to set the Agenda for the democratic meetings
- To scrutinise and ensure the fair operation of Union meetings, referenda and elections
- To recommend sanctions to Student Council if you believe standards have been breached
- To support the Chair during Democratic Meetings in decisions regarding referenda, amendments, etc.
- To engage with Bristol SU's democratic structures, and attend relevant meetings and forums

Fixed- time commitments are:

- Monthly DSC meetings
- Agenda setting DSC meetings - once before each democratic event
- Student Representative Assembly - typically 5 times a year
- Student Council - twice a year
- Annual Members Meeting - once a year

What does a typical month look like?




In a typical month as a Democratic Standards Committee member, you would always attend the monthly DSC meeting, where you discuss and assign Ideas from the Ideas Board to the appropriate avenue. You also could be attending Student Representatives Assembly, holding the Full-Time Officer team to account and discussing ideas for change with student representatives. If it's a month with a democratic event, you would also have an Agenda setting meeting, deciding the order of the motions going to the democratic event. You also may be called in to weigh in on procedural issues and decisions.



What support do you get running in an SU election?

- Sign making workshop to make your campaign materials, with free access to paint and other materials
- Access to the [Candidate SharePoint](#) containing useful resources
- Candidate 1:1 calls to find out more information and answer any questions you may have
- Exclusive series of candidate academy sessions to support you with preparing your elections campaign
- Candidate Breakfasts – during voting week you'll get free breakfast in Senate House every day. This is also a chance for you to talk to other candidates as well as SU staff (if you want!)
- Calm space during voting week
- Candidate Results Night with celebration refreshments
- Budget for specific candidate expenses





What time commitments are there?

To help you get your voice heard by the University and other students, you'll need to commit some time ahead of the election. This could be because you're training or campaigning to become a student leader; it's an exciting and rewarding period!

The Important Stuff

You'll need to write a personal statement, which is your chance to tell students who you are, why you are standing for elections, what your plans are in the role, and why you should get elected. It's time to show them why you're the best person for the role. Please submit this personal statement by **12pm 27 February 2026**.

This year, we are running two Rules Briefings on **Weds 25 Feb 12.30-15.00** and **Tues 3 Mar 12.00-14.30** and we will ask which one you're attending once you've put in your nomination. It's a compulsory session and you won't be able to run in the election if you miss it! But why would you want to miss it?

Voting week runs from **9 March 2026 to 12 March 2026** and this is also your time to campaign. We highly recommend you go out there, show your face, and chat with as many students as possible. As a Faculty Rep, you'll be giving student voices a platform and helping to make positive changes to student's academic experience. Telling them what you hope to do will enhance your chances of winning!

We will be letting you know the results on **13 March 2026** in the SU Living Room. You're welcome to bring your friends/campaign team along with you, and there will be SU staff to offer support should you need it.

Extra Time Commitments Include:

- 1 day of in person training in June 2026
- Team building activity in early September (date TBC)
