- Recognise and value the views and differences of others by working with students from diverse backgrounds

If you're elected, these staff will ensure you are trained and have the support needed to carry out this role.

# What can you expect from the role?

- To lead UG student representation in your Faculty, through the academic representation system
- To represent the Faculty's student interests and priorities, at University level
- To engage with Bristol SU's democratic structures, and attend relevant meetings and forums

Faculty Reps spend an average of 3-4 hours a week on their role during term-time. This includes fixed commitments (such as Faculty Academic Rep Forums or Student Council) and time spent proactively communicating with Course Reps, School Reps and Faculty staff etc.

Fixed time commitments are:

- Faculty Academic Rep Forum meetings - approx. twice a term
- Student Representative Assembly - typically five times a year
- Student Council - typically twice a year
- Annual Members Meeting - once a year
- Regular one-to-one or team sessions with the Bristol SU Academic Rep Coordinator - every 4 to 6 weeks

## What does a typical month look like?

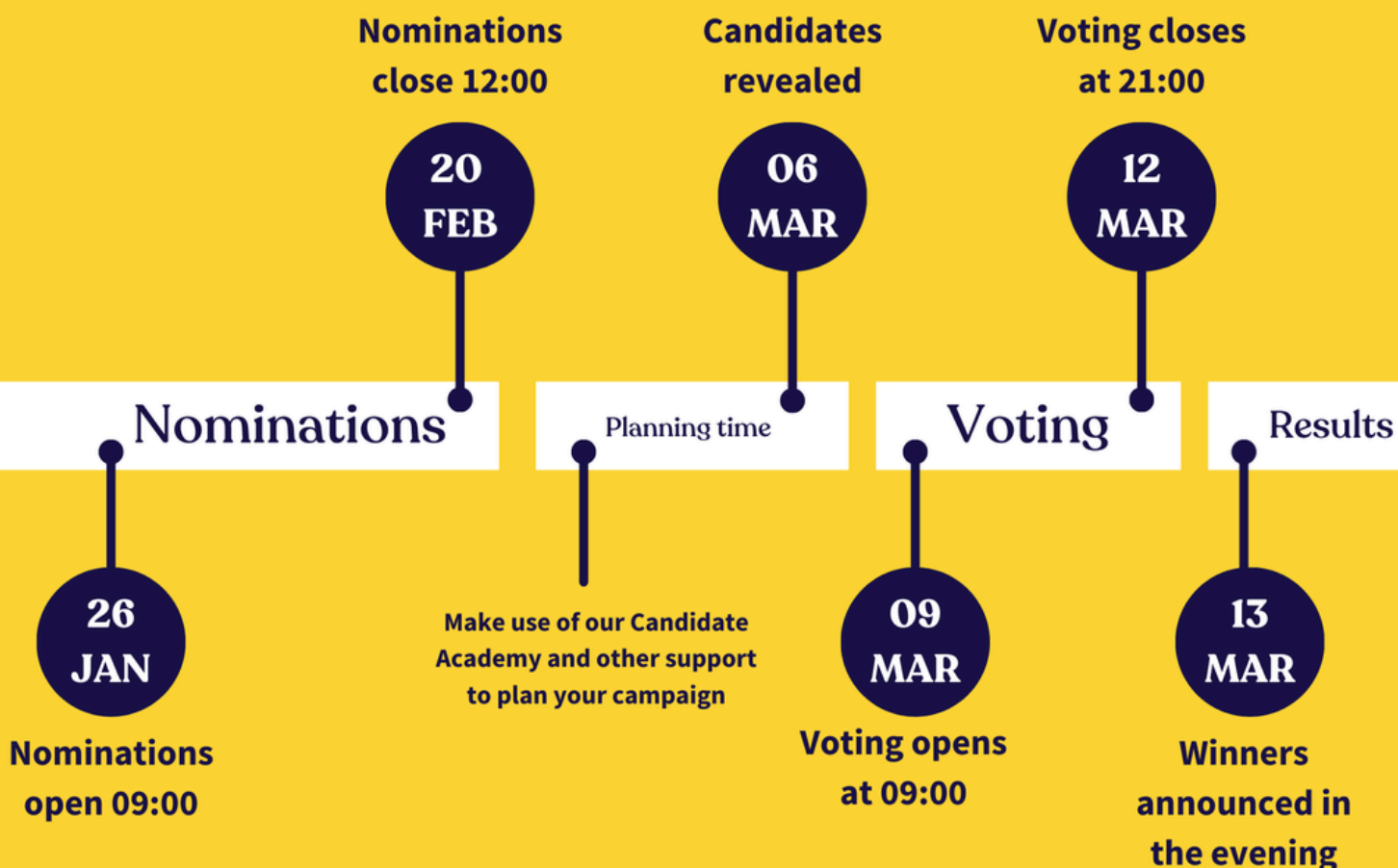


A typical month as a Faculty Rep can vary! You might be attending an SU democratic event, chairing a Faculty Student Academic Rep forum, or running your own meet up with your reps to gather feedback on specific issues. You can expect a monthly meeting with your designated SU one to one, and you might also be meeting with the elected Education Officers to discuss the academic experience and policy at the university.



# What support do you get running in an SU election?

- Sign making workshop to make your campaign materials, with free access to paint and other materials
- Access to the [Candidate SharePoint](#) containing useful resources
- Candidate 1:1 calls to find out more information and answer any questions you may have
- Exclusive series of candidate academy sessions to support you with preparing your elections campaign
- Candidate Breakfasts – during voting week you'll get free breakfast in Senate House every day. This is also a chance for you to talk to other candidates and SU staff.
- Calm space during voting week
- Candidate Results Night with celebration refreshments
- Budget for specific candidate expenses





# What time commitments are there?

To help you get your voice heard by the University and other students, you'll need to commit some time ahead of the election. This could be because you're training or campaigning to become a student leader; it's an exciting and rewarding period!

## The Important Stuff

You'll need to write a personal statement, which is your chance to tell students who you are, why you are standing for elections, what your plans are in the role, and why you should get elected. It's time to show them why you're the best person for the role. Please submit this personal statement by **Fri 27 February 2026 12.00**.

This year, we are running two Rules Briefings on **Weds 25 February 12.30-15.00** and **Tues 3 March 12.00-14.30**, and we will ask which one you're attending once you've put in your nomination. It is a compulsory session and you won't be able to campaign if you miss it!

Voting week runs from **9 March 2026 to 12 March 2026** and this is also your time to campaign. We highly recommend you go out there, show your face, and chat with as many students as possible. As a Faculty Rep, you'll be giving student voices a platform and helping to make positive changes to student's academic experience. Telling them what you hope to do will enhance your chances of winning!

We will be letting you know the results on **13 March 2026** in the SU Living Room. You're welcome to bring your friends/campaign team along with you, and there will be SU staff to offer support should you need it.

## Extra Time Commitments Include:

- 1 day of in person training in June 2026
- Team building activity in early September (date TBC)
