What can you expect from the role?

- Attend interactive and thought-provoking conferences on behalf of students like relevant NUS Conferences and various higher education thinktanks panels
- This year, the Union Affairs Officer has attended national NUS events on building their new representation work and travelled to Westminster to lobby MPs on abolishing the guarantor scheme.
- Attend or contribute to All Party Parliamentary Groups (APPGs), for example the APPG for Students launched an inquiry to consider the impact of cost-of-living pressures
- Represent student views in meetings <u>with senior stakeholders such as the Vice</u> <u>Chancellor</u>
- Contribute to consultations and reports
- Deliver creative campaigns
- Represent students on national TV and radio, create blogs, host award shows and organise events


What does a typical day look like?

This can vary, you can go from representing students in conversation with the Vice Chancellor, to preparing for a sub-committee of the Board of Trustees, to working on a student-facing event! You can help to make sure that there's a voice for underrepresented students by working with the Student Community Organisers or be involved in further development of the Students' Union at Trustee Board. Much of the Union Affairs role is concerned with making sure there is a great offer of services and variety for students.



What support do you get running in an SU election?

- Candidate Campaign Kit (Including a banner, cardboard and various craft materials) and space to paint in the SU Office
- We reimburse your campaign spending up to £65
- Marketing support/guidance and an SU Staff mentor
- Candidate Academy sessions across the nomination period and ahead of voting week to support you with writing a personal statement and running a campaign for yourself
- Candidate Morning Briefings during voting week you'll get a briefing about the voting stats in the SU Office every day. This is also a chance for you to talk to other candidates as well as SU staff. There will be hot drinks & snacks!
- Elections Celebration Evening





What time commitments are there?

To help you get your voice heard by the University and other students, you'll need to commit some time ahead of the election and summer. This could be because you're training or campaigning to become a student leader, it's an exciting and rewarding period!

Time commitments include:

- 6 weeks of Induction starting at the **end of June**
- 2 day residential at some point between **August and September**

Ahead of the election, you'll need to commit some time to rules training and organising your campaign. You'll also need to write a personal statement, just a small brief as to why you want the role when you nominate yourself and upload a picture. We will then give you until **Monday 3 March at 9am** to confirm your personal statement and picture and send us a **3 bullet point summary** of what you stand for, so make sure you utilise our academy sessions.

The Important Stuff

You'll need to attend our Rules Briefing on **Sunday 2 March at 11:00-14:00** on Level 5 of Senate House. This is a compulsory session and you won't be able to run in the election if you miss it and don't catch up. We will provide lunch and you will have a chance to have your headshot taken!

Voting week runs from **Mon 10 March at 9am until Thurs 13 March at 9pm** and this is also your time to campaign. We highly recommend going out and talking to as many students as possible to enhance your chances of winning.

We will be letting you know the results and celebrating all of our candidates' efforts on **Friday 14 March** in the SU Living Rooms. There will be nibbles and drinks and you're welcome to bring your friends/campaign team along with you. SU staff will be on hand to offer support should you need it.
